Committee Work

Bylaws revisions

Being confined to one’s house for months provides an opportunity to really study the eight-page [Bylaws](#) of D21 (nine pages if you count the listing of amendment dates). Earlier this year I reported that the Bylaws

committee proposed a number of technical amendments that the Board of Directors approved at its May 2020 meeting.

Close study has revealed more bad punctuation, missing words, inconsistent word usage, unclear wording, bad grammar, inaccurate references to official positions, and similar technical deficiencies. These are the kinds of errors I looked for when I reviewed drafts of legal opinions as a research attorney. A careful reader can figure out what a sentence was intended to say, but it could be said more clearly. At the next Board of Directors meeting in January 2021, the Bylaws committee will propose 12 sets of technical amendments for the Board's approval.

Probably the most dramatic of the technical amendments is to clarify that the people currently called a unit's "representatives" to the Board of Directors are actually members of the Board, specifically Directors. The governing Board of D21 consists of the Directors (up to two) from each of the 21 units in the District. Yes, so we potentially have a 42-member Board of Directors, though usually units are represented by only one person, if that, at the live Board meetings.

I'd like to see this position clarified in the Bylaws, because for several years when I was one of the representatives of Unit 507 at Board meetings, I had the impression that it was my job to listen to what the Board had decided, occasionally to vote on new candidates for offices and other topics of interest to the Board, and to report to my Unit Board what the District Board had decided. It was not my impression that I was part of

the governing body. Instead I thought at first that the Executive Committee ("ExCom") was the Board. Eventually I learned that the ExCom is really an advisory group to the President. Someone who is going to be elected or appointed to be a member of the District's Board of Directors should immediately understand what the position is. This clarification requires changes to nine sentences in the Bylaws.

The Bylaws committee is also going to propose nine substantive amendments. Substantive amendments will change the way D21 operates in some big and little ways. One of the smaller changes will resolve an ambiguity about which unit officer provides notice to the D21 Secretary about which the alternate Directors a unit has selected. Another one deletes a deadline for unit elections of Directors. There is no need for the District to dictate the schedule of unit elections.

One of the bigger substantive amendments will add a provision specifically allowing the District to hold meetings electronically, as we have been forced to do by the coronavirus pandemic.

Perhaps the biggest proposed change is to extend the terms of the four District officers, President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer, to two years from one. A one-year term may sound like a long time until you consider that the District Board meets only three times a year, during regionals in January, May/June and August/September. So the President presides over three meetings a year, and I'll tell you the position takes some learning on the job. It is the practice in D21 that these positions are

uncontested after the first year in office and the officers are re-elected by acclamation. So why not simply elect officers to two-year terms in the first place and not have annual elections? It would save time at January Board meetings.

Combined with extending the terms is a proposal authorizing the Board of Directors to remove any underperforming officer by a two-thirds vote. Currently the Bylaws provide no mechanism for removing an officer for cause, and there should probably be such a provision even if the terms are not extended.

I don't intend to describe all nine proposed substantive amendments. They will be sent, according to the Bylaws, to the Board of Directors for review at least 30 days before the January meeting.

One of my proposals that didn't make it out of the committee was to downsize the Board of Directors. Just this year, the ACBL's Board of Directors approved a plan to reduce the size of its Board from 25 Directors to 13. So I proposed that if each Unit elected just one Director instead of up to two (and as many alternates as desired), the D21 Board would have 21 Directors instead of 42. But some committee members were concerned that a Unit might go unrepresented if its only Director was suddenly unable to attend a meeting and couldn't arrange for one of the unit's alternates to attend instead.

Written District policies

I finally found time to draft up a list of topics for the new Practices and Policies committee, consisting of Sandi Davis (on

every committee pursuant to the Bylaws), Stu Goodgold, Cornelia Gould, Sigrid Price, and Jackie Zayac, with me as chair. I described the general objective for this committee in my Presidential column in the [May 2020](#) newsletter.

Just like my initial confusion as a new unit "representative" about the membership of D21's Board of Directors, I've also been puzzled about how D21 operates. There are a number of committee chairs and some staff members. I spent my first months as President asking each of them for job descriptions and explanations of any written guidelines for their job performance. My objective is partly to document how the District operates so that newer Directors and D21 members can look up the answers online if they are curious. Beyond documenting how the District operates, I want this committee to consider whether the District's existing practices make sense in light of changing times or should be modified or eliminated. Then I'd like the Board of Directors, based on the committee's proposals, to establish written policies guiding the future operations of D21.

(1). Financial give-aways

One general topic under discussion is how D21 gives away money. Since about 2008, the District has been giving away \$5,000 annually to local charities. One of the criteria employed by our Charity Chair in selecting a charity is that it have no connection to duplicate bridge. This year at the May Board meeting, a virtual one because the Sacramento Regional had been

canceled, the Board approved a motion to increase its charity donations to \$6,000 for this year. Elsewhere in this newsletter you'll see Jeff Hack's column describing the approved charities. We have canceled three more regionals since that meeting. Regionals are the district's main source of income.

Because of the cancellation of the summer Nationals, the district did not give away this year up to \$20,000 to applicants for grants to attend the summer Youth NABC. I'm the chair of the Youth Grant committee. Last year we gave away \$10,000 in grants to 40 applicants. At our January 2020 meeting, the Board voted to double the grant limit.

Also because of the cancellation of Nationals, this year the District has not given away the \$10,400 it might have to the top teams (\$2,000 each) in each of four GNT flights and the second-place teams (\$1,200 each) in Flights B and C. Nor has it given away another \$1,200 it might have to the third-place NAP qualifiers. (Higher NAP qualifiers receive stipends from the ACBL.) The District also grants up to \$300 a year to assist units in holding teaching programs.

It is probably not the case that every successful team and pair asks for a stipend, but potentially D21 could be giving away each year about \$32,000 to bridge-related activities and \$5 to \$6,000 to bridge-unrelated activities.

I've been on the Board long enough to know that when a proposal emerges to increase our handouts, there is virtually no

general discussion about the big financial picture. One meeting it sounds like a good idea to give away another \$1,000 to charities because it's a rough year. Another meeting it sounds like a good idea to give youth applicants more in grants.

At the very least, it seems to me, the District should adopt a policy that it does not give away money when it is not making money. Perhaps, as Unit 507 proposed at the September Board meeting, the District should redirect its charitable inclinations to directly promoting bridge, which is one of the District's objectives according to our Bylaws. Can the District afford to give away \$5,000 annually to charity when we own a deteriorating set of card tables?

As the Youth Grant Chair, I believe that youths should be encouraged to play bridge, but I question whether giving individual applicants an average of \$300 apiece to attend the nationals is the best way to accomplish that objective. Perhaps instead the youth bridge organizations within the District should make written applications for grants to fund their programs, providing more teachers or more supplies. I've traced the history of the youth grant program in D21, and I don't believe that there was any policy decision made by the Board that attending the YNABC is the best way to encourage youth bridge.

It may take five different policies to address all the D21 give-aways, but I think the Board should gain a better focus on the bigger financial picture in discussing these policies.

(2). Financial controls

I'm a lawyer, not an accountant, but some of my best friends are accountants. It is hard for them to believe that D21, with over \$400,000 in assets, functions without a written policy requiring any major transactions to be reviewed or approved by anyone other than the people who write the checks on D21 accounts. I trust our Treasurer and our Tournament Manager. I believe they excel in their positions and are responsible for the District's assets being what they are, along with people like Calvin Harper, who has given so much of his life to transporting regional and sectional supplies for the district.

But I also believe that every organization needs a system of financial checks and balances. Yes, the Board of Directors sees a balance sheet and a profit and loss statement from the Treasurer three times a year, but the Board doesn't review the details of the regional hotel contracts. Pam Hughes, our Tournament Manager, has shared them with me so I can provide some legal insights into how we might be able to negotiate cancellations due to the pandemic, but this has not been a regular practice in the district.

It is not practical to involve a Board that meets three times a year in the details of ongoing contract negotiations, but the Board should delegate the authority to some officers to regularly review and approve of those actions by other officers and personnel that involve substantial commitments of D21's assets.

It will doubtless take some time for this committee to draft such a financial controls

policy, and more time for the Board to discuss it, modify it, and approve it. But the financial future of the District could be at stake, so it will be time well spent.

These are just two of the five topics I'd like this committee to examine and to propose some policies for adoption by the Board of Directors. You can see that this is a major project. It's barely getting started in my first year as President and that is ending in early January. It is unlikely it will be finished in another year. But I would like to try to make D21 operations much more transparent, understandable, and contemporary.

Another big topic to be addressed is whether D21 should plan to remain in the sectional supply business.

Next District Board meeting

As indicated in my comments above, some of this committee work is being done in preparation for the next District Board meeting, another virtual meeting, which will be held on January 9, 2021, what would be the last day of the Monterey Regional if we were having that regional.

For the last two virtual meetings I've requested units to select one of their two representatives/Directors to appear on the unit's behalf so that the Zoom screen isn't filled with 50 faces (up to 42 Directors, four District officers, our District Director, several committee chairs). If both representatives wanted to appear, they were welcome.

This time all the Directors will be invited, as we'll be considering some

substantive amendments to the Bylaws. It remains to be seen how manageable such a large meeting will be and how long it will take to hear from everyone, because I believe that everyone who wants to speak should be heard. Though we can't meet face-to-face yet, I still think we can make a lot of progress by virtual meetings.

Annual Charity Report

Every year District 21 allocates \$5,000 to charities. At the May Board meeting the District 21 Board voted to allocate \$6,000 this year. Nominations are accepted between January 1 and July 4 each year. In 2019 the board voted to accept nominations only from units. Individuals who have a charity request need to go to a board and get them to make the nomination request. It doesn't have to be your own unit board.



After watching the news and seeing how many people don't have enough food to eat, our plan this year is to donate to Food Banks and Food Pantries. Most Food Banks are connected through Feeding America even though we donate to each individually. We seem to have a two-tier country right now. The wealthy and the well-off who can invest in stocks are doing great as the stock market approaches all-time highs while those who are near the bottom don't even have food to eat. They wait hours in line to get a free supply of food.

Normally, we announce the selections at the All-Western Board meeting. This year that Board meeting was via Zoom.

This year we wanted to donate to charities that were helping the needy. Many people do not even have food to eat. This year the four charities nominated were selected to each receive \$1,500. All the nominations were for charities that met our criteria and all are long-term charities. They were approved by the Board of Directors at the board meeting in September.

The charities selected and the nominating units were: Richmond Emergency Food Pantry (www.refp.org) (Unit 497); Samaritan House – San Mateo (<https://samaritanhousesanmateo.org>) (Unit 498); Alameda County Community Food Bank (www.accfb.org) (Unit 501); and Community Service Agency of Mt. View, Los Altos and Los Altos Hills (www.csacares.org) (Unit 503).

It might appear there is a Bay Area bias, but all the nominations were from units that made their recommendations independently.

Bridge clubs are all closed. Tournaments are canceled. If it wasn't for BBO bridge would be dead. We can't donate to our local clubs but you can support them through BBO.

I know that most players have spent less on bridge this year than budgeted for the year. The Cares Act has a special provision that you can donate up to \$300 and you can deduct this from your income tax even if you take the standard deduction. This would be a good year to take advantage of this provision. Just make sure that it's a 501(c)(3) charity.

I've had a rare three-month hiatus since my last Unit 507 ("U507") column for the September newsletter because the newsletter's publication schedule was changed at the September 2020 Board of Directors meeting to quarterly. I know I tried to stay loyal to our club and play in a regular Wednesday morning open game (with the proceeds going to our directors), but from week to week we wouldn't get the minimum table count needed, and my partner and I had to scramble to find another game. The open

game eventually folded. I'm not trying to hold myself out as a paragon. One of my other partners regularly plays three or four games a day and can't afford to play in local clubs all the time, so I've agreed to a regular \$1.75 game at a time when we could play in a local club for black points. I suspect some other partnerships have gone in the same directions. So the San Jose Bridge Center is offering less than one daily game now, and the Friday evening game is succeeding because it's a joint effort or pool with the Santa Cruz club.

However, it does appear that unit members are finding places to play online, even if not in our virtual club, because they keep advancing through the masterpoint ranks.
