According to this District's Bylaws, one of the District's objectives is "[t]o publish a periodical for members and Units in the District." It's my belief that the District Board needs to communicate regularly with the membership to let members know what the District has been doing and is planning to do. Particularly in these isolated times, a newsletter helps foster a sense of community. As President I undertook to compose a monthly column reporting progress at the District level to the membership.

In these pandemic times, District 21 ("D21") has been unable to carry out one of its core functions, which is holding regionals. In September 2020, the Board decided to cut back on publication of this newsletter from monthly to quarterly till there is more to report and D21 has some income. But that doesn't mean the District Board has been twiddling its thumbs while face-to-face bridge has halted.

In this column I'm going to report on the highlights of activity at the District level



New District 21 President

First, I want to thank Ray Yuenger for his leadership. He is an asset to the district, and I am grateful that he will continue to serve on the district's executive committee and lend his expertise to benefit all of us.

This is a challenging time for the game we all love. I believe we have a great opportunity to increase the awareness of bridge as we explore online opportunities and how to return to live bridge. I hope to harness our resources, energize volunteers, and grow bridge. The talented team I am assembling is already hard at work to set us up to modernize the organization. We will then concentrate our energy on growing our membership and helping our units and clubs adapt to the new hybrid online/live model of our game. I have dreams of improving the player experience for all levels of the game, building community and making it fun.

For those who do not know me. I live in Marin County with my husband and two high school age children. I started playing bridge when my daughter, now 15, was in the womb. I have a career that allows me



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since my last column in December and then review what has been accomplished during my year as President.

Board meetings

January 9

On January 9, 2021, the District Board held its regularly scheduled meeting on what would have been the penultimate day of the Monterey regional. There was one item on the agenda that I thought would require some discussion, namely a number of proposed amendments to the Bylaws, some technical, some substantive. As I reported in my December column, the Bylaws committee had been hard at work since proposing amendments that were adopted at the May 30, 2020 Board meeting. The directors were given over 30 days' notice of the proposed new amendments. A couple of directors had informed me in advance of January 9 that they had some questions about a couple of the proposals.

Amending the Bylaws requires a two-thirds vote of those present. Complicating the vote counting is that units get weighted votes based on the size of their membership. Every unit gets one vote with an additional vote for every 200 members. The units with the most votes, six, are Diablo Valley, Palo Alto, and Sacramento. Even the smallest units, six of them, currently have two votes.

Complicating the voting even further on January 9 was a recent Zoom upgrade that relocated some functions usable for voting, namely indicating "yes" or "no" or virtually raising one's hand. I thought my computer was automatically upgrading software, but it hadn't picked up those

changes, so I ended up misadvising people during the meeting about where to find these functions.

To bypass as much of this confusion as possible, I organized the voting to proceed by way of unanimous consent as to any items not specifically flagged for individual discussion and separate votes. By this expedient ten of the 12 sets of technical changes were approved without objection or separate discussion.

Without advance notice, a proposal to change "he/she" and "she/he" to "s/he" was identified as controversial for excluding gender-fluid and gender-neutral people. This led to a lively discussion about the evolution of language and society for about 18 minutes with several proposed revisions to the amendment. Finally a compromise was proposed and approved for the Bylaws committee to implement.

After 14 more minutes of discussion about where and whether to relocate a definition of "mail," a topic that had been flagged in advance, a compromise was reached.

While all these changes were technical, I was particularly pleased to see revisions made to clearly identify the people designated by their units to attend Board meetings as the Directors of the District Board, not merely "representatives" to the Board. I hope that when this group of people recognizes they are the District's Board of Directors, some will become more engaged in decision-making for the betterment of the District.

Next up on the agenda were ten sets of substantive amendments. Some are more significant than others. Without

reviewing all ten of them, one eliminated the voting power of D21's ACBL Director. It wasn't clear who the Director should be representing when voting on questions for the Board, the Director's unit, the entire Board, or the individual. Another change expressly authorizes meeting electronically when necessary as we have been doing already. Another change empowers the Board to remove an officer at any time by supermajority vote without waiting for the officer's term to end. Also procedures for removing members of the District Board were clarified.

Three of the ten proposed amendments were flagged for individual discussion and the rest passed without objection. One proposal that failed to gain supermajority approval was to eliminate the Western Conference Representative as a mandatory member of the Executive Committee ("ExCom"). Under the Bylaws, certain officers are automatically on the ExCom while other members are named by the President. After all, the Bylaws say that the purpose of the ExCom is to "provide advice, counsel, guidance, and support to the President."

A final proposed change was recognized as requiring a good deal of additional discussion and the Board meeting had already lasted two hours. The Board voted to table that topic and the meeting proceeded by honoring the recipients of Goodwill awards from the District's Goodwill committee and from the D21 President. Those honorees are mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter.

January meetings are traditionally when Board officers are elected, but at

25 minutes after noon, the Board agreed to continue its meeting and any further business till January 30.

After the meeting I got some feedback proposing that the Board meet more than three times a year when necessary. It has turned out during the pandemic that the ACBL Board has been meeting on a monthly basis rather than three times a year before the nationals. If I could have foreseen all the discussion needed about technical amendments, I would have proposed a special Board meeting just to discuss the Bylaws changes and proceeded with the regular agenda on January 9.

January 30

The week preceding the January 30 meeting was filled with numerous email messages among Board members about one of the topics on the agenda. It turns out that when the President of Monterey Unit 530 signed a lease for club premises beginning in October 2019, the unit provided the landlord with a federal taxpayer number that, according to the Internal Revenue Service website, identified the organization's legal name as "District 21, American Contract Bridge League, a California corporation." So D21 was named the tenant on the lease, and this characterization was carried into a First Amendment of the lease signed at an unknown time in 2020.

In October 2020 some members of the U530 Board brought this misnomer to my attention as D21 President, asking if the signature was authorized and how it affected U530's lease obligations. I responded that U530 and D21 were separate entities and U530 was not authorized to sign contracts

on behalf of D21. On December 5, in response to a message by another U530 Board member, I asked the Unit to arrange with its landlord to modify the lease to reflect the proper tenant. Without repeating the more than 50 emails in this discussion, whether the D21 Board wanted to ratify or disavow this lease was on the agenda for the 30th.

Early in the meeting on the 30th, another technical issue emerged. A test revealed that a new Zoom function enabling voting by recorded poll results was not working, so we had to fall back on plan B for conducting votes, namely private chat to the D21 Secretary, who could then record and weigh the votes before counting them.

After committee chair reports, the Board returned to the last proposed Bylaws amendment, to extend the terms of Board officers from one year to two. The proposal was based on the tradition that Board officers have routinely been re-elected every year in uncontested elections, except that every two years there has been a contested election for Vice-President, because, again by tradition, after the President's term ended after two one-year terms, the Vice-President would be elected President without opposition. There typically hasn't been politicking for District Board positions. It took some arm-twisting before I agreed to run for Vice-President. In addition to eliminating an unnecessary election, the proposal would have allowed a new President more time than the six meetings held in two years to make progress on longer-term projects. After discussion, this amendment failed to obtain supermajority approval.

Next on the agenda, due to the failure of this amendment, were elections of Board officers. The Secretary, Sandi Davis, Treasurer, Jean Barry, and Vice-President, Sigrid Price, were re-elected by affirmation with no other candidates nominated. However, there was a surprise nomination from the floor by Jackie Zayac of Tracey Bauer for President. I say "surprise" because this nomination wasn't mentioned during the ExCom meeting the previous evening, although the next day's agenda was the main topic of that meeting. The Bylaws do allow for nominations from the floor.

Although I was hosting the Zoom meeting, we had to arrange for me to leave the Board meeting while Tracey made a presentation. (Tracey has kindly shared her PowerPoint presentation with me, which I'll view after this newsletter is published.) There were some technical difficulties in arranging another meeting host but I left the meeting and returned in about ten minutes after seeing some chat saying it was my turn to speak. I spoke briefly and then the Board was asked to submit their chat votes to the Secretary while we proceeded to an election to fill two positions on the Board of Governors.

Anne Hollingsworth, Max Schireson, and Jackie Zayac were running for those positions. There was a lot of discussion about whether each Director should cast one vote, thereby electing the top two vote-receivers, or whether each Director should cast one vote for each of the two open positions, thereby electing the top two vote-receivers. A majority favored the second method. Each of the candidates

made a presentation while I placed the other two in a virtual waiting room and then the Board proceeded to cast chat votes while the next issue was addressed.

The next question asked was whether the Board in 2021 wanted to continue its practice of giving \$5,000 annually to charities unrelated to bridge when D21 has had no income from its last four regionals. Jeff Hack, the Charity chair, recommended not making donations. After some discussion the Board proceeded to cast chat votes while I reported that D21 is still in the process of completing its purchase of the van previously leased to move tournament supplies. While we had paid the remaining balance on the lease in October, the lessor had been slow in providing the title documents, which had arrived a week before the January 30 meeting. It remains for the District to record the transfer of title.

The Secretary announced the results of the votes. Tracey, Jackie, and Anne were each the successful candidates. The Board deferred making any charitable donations in 2021.

The Board voted to reward the third-place NAP qualifiers.

It was about noon and the topic of the Monterey lease was discussed. Susan Mazzei, the District Board member from Monterey (who was also the lease signer), reported being in negotiations with the landlord to amend the lease to eliminate D21 as the tenant. Further discussion about the D21 Board taking a position on these negotiations was tabled.

As part of this discussion, the Board accepted the offer by Lynn Bartz, a Director

from U507, to send the IRS name changes for D21 units so that no similar confusion will arise from IRS records in the future. The Board also accepted Lynn's offer going forward to prepare the annual 990 forms reflecting the group exemption that D21 has obtained on behalf of many of its units.

My Presidency

Tracey has kindly suggested I include a review of my year as President of D21 in this, my valedictory column as President. From my prior monthly columns, you may have concluded I'm loquacious in print. I have tried in those columns to share everything that might be of interest to D21 members. You can read or reread those columns in the newsletters on the D21 website. I don't want to repeat myself, so I'll just mention what comes to mind first.

Hotel contracts and cancellations

Looking back, as the new D21 President I was prepared to have discussions about how we can manage the national trend of reduced turnout at regionals. I was not prepared to be researching force majeure contracts in hotel contracts or keeping up with public health announcements at national, state, and local levels as they pertained to the viability of holding a regional. Needs must. D21 has successfully negotiated the cancellations of hotel contracts in Sacramento, Santa Clara, Sparks (Reno), and Monterey without liability. Pam Hughes, our tournament manager, was key to these negotiations as she was instrumental in making the contracts. I provided background support

regarding the legal language required to justify invocation of force majeure clauses.

I was also able to propose some language changes in future contracts with the Monterey hotel that will minimize D21's financial exposure.

Bylaws

During a tournament hiatus, it was a good time to focus on the organization of D21. The President is an ex officio member of all committees. I was actively involved with the Bylaws committee (Stu Goodgold, Sigrid Price, Jackie Zayac, Marion Robertston, chair) and we proposed several sets of amendments, including some technical amendments that were approved at the May 2020 meeting as well as the amendments adopted in January 2021. There is always room for improvement, but I believe D21 now has some up-to-date Bylaws conforming to the current Bylaws and regulations of the ACBL and anticipating the future changes from 25 District Directors to 13 Regional Directors.

Surfacing and updating the operations of D21

When I became President I surveyed many of the officers, committee chairs, and other D21 personnel and created a Practices and Policies committee (Stu, Jackie, Sigrid, Cornelia Gould, with me as chair) with the following objectives. First, figure out how D21 and all its departments have been operating. Are decisions made pursuant to written guidelines or Board policies? Is a chair or officer compensated by way of stipend or otherwise? Second,

document these practices. Third, determine options for what the policies should be for a particular department or operation. Fourth, educate the District Board about the existing practices and propose policies by which the Board can provide guidance to the organization. Finally, publicize the Board policies, so that the organization and operation of D21 is transparent to new Board members and indeed the entire membership. There has been one meeting so far of this committee followed by some extensive email discussions. It has a lot of ground to cover and frankly, an early proposal for a financial review policy was too full of legalese (by me) for the committee to act on. A revision is in the works.

The 99er program

One of my more pleasurable duties has been attending to a new interdistrict program (now including West Coast Districts 17, 21, 22, and 23) with two main objectives. (1) Create an online game for an underserved part of our membership, the 99ers, and offer them some post-game free lessons. (2) Provide the home clubs of these 99ers in our districts with an income stream based on a part of the table fees not needed to operate the program.

This program is modeled on one created by Jay Whipple in D9 (Florida) and he has generously offered the use of his software as needed to enroll local clubs. (A feature of this program is that a club can enroll its 99ers in our club without pooling its entire membership.)

The first game was on October 19. Through the end of December, D21 clubs have been paid \$5,199.24 in table fees. D21 is by far the largest contributor of players. The game averages about 35 tables a night currently. It is self-sustaining. Management discussions involve how many boards to offer and how much to charge during Silver Linings weeks and how much we can afford to send back each month to local clubs. We are trying to figure out how to minimize the workload of the group's treasurer, who is volunteering her time sending over 50 checks a month to local clubs and paying our staff of two directors, two teachers, and two director-teachers. I know some VACBs are struggling to keep their doors open, so the success of this game has been encouraging, particularly as we are reaching the newer bridge players who will be the foundation for the survival of the ACBL and D21.

On that happy note, I'll say thanks for the opportunity to serve as District President, even for a short time. I apologize to those I presumably offended along the way. I recognize there have been growing pains getting used to and keeping up with using Zoom while presiding at a meeting. There were missteps in proposing returning the tournament supplies van and putting supplies in a less accessible storage pod, but those mistakes were avoided in time after further study.

I know Tracey, our new President, is bringing a lot of energy and enthusiasm to reimagining D21. She will need your help, so answer her call. I intend to.

District 21 2021 GNTs

According to the latest announcement from the ACBL:



Grand National Teams

- 2020 National Final, scheduled for Montreal, was canceled.

- For Districts whose 2020 District Finals were completed:

- Districts are strongly encouraged to send teams to the 2021 National Finals if they were announced as your representatives for Montreal.

- Districts should not hold District Finals in 2021 if 2020 winners are established.

District 21 will accordingly be sending our 2020 winners to the 2021 GNT Championships. All masterpoint qualifications from 2020 will be honored for this 2021 contest. These Championships will be held in July, 2021, either in Providence or online, depending on the pandemic's duration. D21 will not hold a grass roots GNT contest in 2021.

The next iteration of our District GNTs will be held in 2022. By this time, we all fervently hope face to face bridge will have returned. If not, the 2022 contest will be held online. Be ready to use Zoom if our GNTs are held online; Zoom will be a required element of entering the event. Zoom adds a personal element of contact missing from our normal BBO games, and makes security much more palatable. It won't replace the experience of holding cards, being with all our friends and foes, and travelling to tournaments, but it's a good step closer!

Tampa Board of Directors Online Meeting - Fall, 2020

Last Fall, the ACBL Board of Directors held its meetings in San Francisco and we all left expecting to celebrate Thanksgiving 2020 in Tampa, Florida. Instead, the ACBL Board of Directors held its Fall meetings online on November 18-20, 2020. The silver lining is that the meetings were held a week ahead of Thanksgiving which gave the Board the opportunity to spend the holiday with friends and family for the first time in years. Of course, this is not a normal year and, hopefully, people did not gather together, especially with the spike in Covid-19 cases we have experienced in December. Some days, I feel like I am living a year in the Twilight Zone!



Here are some of the election and appointment results from the Fall meeting:

- Georgia Heth was elected to serve a second year as the ACBL President.
- Carlos Munoz was elected as a 401K Trustee for a four-year term from January 1, 2021 – December 31, 2024.
- Cindy Shoemaker was elected as a Trustee of the Charity Foundation for a four-year term from January 1, 2021 – December 31, 2024.
- Nancy Strohmer was elected to fill a vacated term as a Trustee of the Charity Foundation which will end on December 31, 2021.

- Lane Galloway of Laredo, Texas is the 2021 Aileen Osofsky ACBL Goodwill Member of the Year.
- Uday Ivatury is the 2021 Honorary Member of the Year.
- Jay Whipple is the 2021 Volunteer Member of the Year.

The Board reviewed and approved the special event calendar for 2021 after making two changes. There will be a one-week event benefitting the ACBL Education Foundation in February 2021 and a one-week event benefitting the ACBL Charity Foundation in April 2021. Initially, two days were proposed for each event, but the Board increased both events to a one-week duration.

Ratification of Audit Firm – The firm of Dixon Hughes Goodman, LLP was approved as the ACBL auditors for fiscal years 2020 – 2022. It became effective immediately.

Report on Hearings – The Appeals and Charges Committee reported that it had approved five negotiated settlements for cheating cases. The Board received the report by a vote of 25-0.

CDR Revisions - This motion made changes in the section of the codification regarding an ACBL member in good standing, which appellate body has jurisdiction over a disciplinary case, charged party’s rights and automatic review and appeal procedures. The motion was approved by a vote of 24-0-1. I voted yes. It became effective immediately.

Operating and Capital Budget – The 2021 Operating Budget and the 2021 Capital

were received by the Board. The vote was 25-0. It became effective immediately.

U.S. Currency for Membership Dues’ Transactions – Amend the codification to allow for the payment of membership dues in U.S. dollars only. The vote was 24-1. I voted yes. It became effective immediately.

Budget Calendar – This motion changes the timing of the budget process. The budget for the next calendar year will be finalized no later than November 1, approved by the Finance Committee and then presented to the full Board for ratification prior to the end of the calendar year. The vote was 25-0. It is effective January 31, 2021.

Platinum Events – Amend the Platinum Events entry requirements for paid up ACBL members, who have earned at least fifty (50) platinum points to qualify to play in said Platinum Events, to require the accumulation of platinum points from the nine (9) most recently held in-person NABCs. THIS IS MY MOTION! Tracey Bauer brought this issue to my attention during the summer and I submitted this motion to keep everyone impacted by this requirement from being negatively affected as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The vote was 25-0. It is effective retroactive to January 1, 2020.

Alert Chart – Approve the Alert Procedures as presented by the Competitions and Conventions Committee in 2020. Some of the changes include rather than saying “transfer”, the suit will be named, state the length of a suit rather than “could be short” and support doubles will no longer be alerted. Grant Robinson has inserted a link to the new Alert Procedure to my report on the D21 website. The vote was

25-0. It will be effective January 1, 2021.

The next four motions were all recommended by the Transition Task Force as the Board begins to reduce from 25 to 13 members. There will be a new system of delegating authority to management, but everything will continue normally while the delegation to management takes place over time.

Establish a Framework for Operating Guidelines—Amend Codification Chapter II – Business Management, A. Finance, Section 3 – Management Functions to add the following:

3.6 The ACBL Board delegates authority to ACBL management in the program areas identified by, and subject to the specifications and constraints listed in, a newly created Appendix 2D – Operating Guidelines.

The vote was 25-0. It will be effective January 1, 2021.

Overall Operating Guidelines – Codification Appendix 2D – Operating Guidelines shall include a Section 1 as follows:

- Overall

As functions shift from the ACBL Board of Directors to ACBL management, the Board intends that current operations continue except where noted within these Operating Guidelines.

The vote was 25-0. It will be effective January 1, 2021.

Operating Guidelines for NABC Site Selection – Codification Appendix 2D – Operating Guidelines shall include a Section 2 as follows:

2 NABC Site Selection

- ACBL management shall maintain a standard Request for Proposal (RFP) for NABC site selection. The ACBL President and the Finance Chair must be alerted to any changes to the RFP.

- It is the expectation of the Board that NABCs will be profitable, however, ACBL management may provide any reasonable budget for any proposed NABC site. As manpower permits, ACBL management shall update budget projections for approved NABC sites if substantial changes to the projections occur.

- The Board shall continue to be responsible for any decision to change the number of annual NABC tournaments.

The vote was 24-1. I voted yes. The effective date will be the earlier of January 1, 2022 or the approval of operating guidelines by the NABC Review Committee.

Operating Guidance for NABC Review - Codification Appendix 2D – Operating Guidelines shall include a Section 3 as follows:

3 NABC Review

- The Board of Directors must approve substantial changes to NABC events and start times.

The vote was 25-0. The effective date will be the earlier of January 1, 2022 or the approval of operating guidelines by the NABC Review Committee.

ACBL Logo – Codification Chapter III – Administration, C. Legal, Section 2 – Seal and Emblem, subsection 2.2 is stricken and replaced with the following:

2.2 The ACBL’s logo suite may be updated from time to time by ACBL management with Board approval.

The logo was described in detail in the codification and reference to it must be removed to allow the ACBL to roll out a new logo suite which will occur in the near future. The vote was 24-1. I voted yes. The effective date will be as soon as ACBL management can implement the changes.

Unsuccessful Motions

Teaching Clubs/Centers Incentives

(1) – Modify the ACBL Guest Membership Program by offering new players a one-year membership discount available exclusively through teachers, teaching clubs and teaching centers. The motion failed by a vote of 2-23. I voted against the motion because I want all of our new members to have access to the best rate for membership.

Teaching Clubs/Centers Incentives

(2) – Offer one to two additional Club Championship games with no sanction fee based on objective recruiting performance. The motion failed by a vote of 0-25.

Teaching Clubs/Centers Incentives

(3) – The ACBL shall feature teaching clubs and teaching centers in its advertising, targeting known Guest Members and new prospects. The motion failed by a vote of 0-25.

Teaching Clubs/Centers Incentives

(4) – The ACBL shall award extra matching Cooperative Advertising Program funds to the top recruiting teaching clubs and teaching centers. The motion failed by a vote of 0-25.

Unit and Club Teacher Recommendations – The ACBL shall establish procedures to enable teaching clubs and Unit Board of Directors to recommend teachers who teach at clubs or bridge centers to teach beginning bridge classes, record the recommendations for all members in good standing and list the teachers on the trybridge.org website. The motion failed and the vote was 0-25.

Teaching Clubs and Teaching Centers

– The ACBL shall establish procedures for designating teaching clubs and teaching centers and make a list of teaching clubs and teaching centers available to new prospects in response to their search for how to learn bridge. The motion failed and the vote was 0-25.

As I write this report, the first vaccines for COVID-19 are being given in the United States. I hope that you are all staying safe and healthy during the pandemic. I am hopeful that this is the beginning of the end of our life in the Twilight Zone.

Board of Directors Special Meeting December 16, 2020

The ACBL Board of Directors held its final special meeting of the year on December 16, 2020. The following are the motions that were considered during the meeting.



OEOC Committee – Brian Platnick was appointed as a replacement member to the Online Ethical Oversight Committee. The vote was 25-0. It is effective immediately.

Masterpoint Formula Modified for Strength of Field – In all tournament events for which the overall awards are calculated by formula, (including Individuals, Pairs, Swiss Teams, Board-a-Match Teams, excluding STaCs and events with arbitrary first place awards, such as the Grand National Teams and excluding all events with a knockout phase, the masterpoint formula shall be modified to account for the strength of the field in that event. This was the second reading of this motion. The vote was 25-0. It will be effective on January 1, 2021 or as soon as management can implement it.

Reducing Masterpoint Awards To Reflect Non-Face-To-Face Play – In all events conducted online in which ACBL gold, silver or red points are awarded, all masterpoint awards shall be 80% of the amount that would be awarded in a face-to-face game of the same structure, as calculated by applicable formulas. This was the second reading of this motion. The vote was 24-1. I voted yes.

CBF Mixed Team Awards – The arbitrary award for the CBF Mixed Team Championship shall be 80 Gold masterpoints, with a match award of 8.00 Red points and with the minimum table rule applying. This was the second reading of this motion. The vote was 25-0. It is effective immediately and retroactive for 2020.

Reconsideration Of Budget Calendar – At the Tampa Board Meeting, the Board voted to change the timing of the budget process. The budget for the next calendar year will be finalized no later than November 1, approved by the Finance Committee and then presented to the full Board for ratification prior to the end of the calendar year. The vote was 25-0. It is effective January 31, 2021. At this meeting, the Board was asked to reconsider and defeat this motion so the language could be changed. The vote was 0-25 and it was defeated.

Budget Calendar – After defeating the Tampa motion, the Board voted on the following language. The budget for the next calendar year will be finalized no later than October 15, approved by the Finance Committee and then presented to the full Board for ratification in November. The vote was 24-1. I voted yes. It will be effective January 31, 2021.

Bifurcation of Codification – The Codification is being divided into two parts. The provisions of the Codification will either be part of the Governance/ Corporation Policy or Bridge Operations Policy. The vote was 23-1-1. I voted yes. It is effective immediately.



COVID 19: Calculated Odds,

Void in a Deal – 19 to 1

Yes, that's right. The odds of getting a void in a hand are 19 to 1 or about 5%. Fortunately, the odds seem to be higher for being dealt the virus.



There was an election for the District Director from D21 last summer. In case you were not aware of any voting it may be because just unit board members are involved in voting. To summarize, I was elected as the new District Director for D21 and started serving as of January 2021.

This being my first article as a District Director in quite a few years, I realize that everyone reading so far may not be familiar with the governing structure of the ACBL. If you are, just skip down beyond the next four paragraphs.

The ACBL has about 152,000 members, although that number has been in decline this year due to a little matter known as COVID-19. The ACBL includes most of North America, namely the US, Canada, Mexico, and Bermuda. The ACBL consists of 25 Districts, with each District having two or more units within their boundaries. There are about 300 units all told; our District 21 has 21 units... quite convenient to remember. Every sanctioned club is within the geographic limits of a unit; there are roughly 3,000 clubs in all.

Along with the ACBL, every District and Unit has its own board of directors, which make decisions for the organization, be they business, financial, strategic, or

bridge-related. Each of the 25 districts elects a district director who sits on the ACBL Board of Directors (hereafter, the BoD to keep it short). However, that is changing over the next three years, so that the size of the BoD will be reduced to 13 by 2025.

Additionally, each District currently elects five members for the Board of Governors (BoG), which acts as a broad-based advisory board to review decisions by the BoD, and propose motions of its own for the BoD to approve (which happens very seldom... the approvals, not the proposals). The elections for the District Director and the five BoG members are done exclusively by voting of the boards of each Unit within the District, with votes weighted by the number of members in each unit. If you wonder why you don't get a vote, make an effort to get on your unit board and have your say.

In past years the Board of Directors would meet before each of the three NABCs, commonly called nationals, held every year. These are sensibly enough called the Spring, Summer, and Fall NABCs. But this has been no ordinary, or sensible, year as everyone is aware. While it has been only five weeks since the year began, the full board has already met four times via Zoom.

The BoD makes numerous business and governance decisions, most of which are of minor concern to the average bridge player. Rather than bore you with such arcane details here, I will keep it short and report mostly on what affects our district and the players within our district. Anyone truly interested in the full workings of the BoD can find the details in the official minutes or just chat with me.

Last fall the BoD approved the new Alert Procedures. Hopefully, you have all seen them by now and have read the Bridge Bulletin of January 2021 where the highlights were discussed. I hope you especially noted the last part in which it is stated that transitioning to the new alert rules is expected to take some time and leniency will be applied as we make that move.

Even though 2021 has barely begun, the BoD has already made some pertinent decisions.

With the cancelling of almost all live bridge events, ACBL management made difficult decisions to cut expenses significantly. Online bridge proved to be so popular that revenues for 2020 were down only a little but expenses were down considerably more. The ACBL had a net increase of \$2.5M in assets on gross revenues of almost \$16M. The budget for 2021 includes \$300K for marketing incentives, mainly to reverse the decline in membership over the last year.

The North American Pairs (NAP) were not held in 2020. The top pairs in the D21 NAP Finals for Flights A, B, and C from 2019 were carried over to compete for the championship at the 2021 Spring NABC. Unfortunately, this event was cancelled due to COVID-19. Instead, the NAP championships will be held online. Normally, those who finish 1st or 2nd in their flight are awarded \$700 and \$300 respectively for competing in the event. There was much discussion by the BoD whether the money was a prize or meant as a reimbursement for expenses. The decision was to allow the moneys to be paid even though players have no expense

for playing online (yes, the entry fee is waived) primarily because management had already told the participants it is a prize. The next cycle of the NAP starts this summer, but the 'prize' might be changed to a 'reimbursement'. D21 has been supplementing the NAP awards by giving \$200 to the third place finishers who compete in the championships. After some debate, the D21 board voted to also pay the third place prize for this year.

Another significant change in the works is a reduction in the size of the Board of Governors (BoG). This change requires an amendment to the ACBL Bylaws. Any change to the Bylaws requires a 2/3 vote in favor, plus a second reading and 2/3 vote to be taken at least 30 days after the amendment is published in the Bulletin. Bottom line – bylaws changes are not quick or easy. The proposed change reduces the BoG from five members per district down to three members per district. It more broadly defines the purpose of the BoG and also identifies three specific standing committees for the BoG. The amendment passed the first reading 20-5, more than the required 2/3 majority. As a former long-time and very active member of the BoG, I fully support the intent of the amendment to make the BoG more active and meaningful. However, I voted No on the amendment as written because the current bylaws define only one required committee, that of the BoD Executive Committee, whose decisions are a commitment upon the whole ACBL. No other committees are defined in the current bylaws, and in my opinion, adding three much less important standing committees is a degree of specificity that is unwarranted and undesired in these bylaws.

The BoD has an Appeals and Charges Committee, which is the final body to hear cases involving ethical violations. There is also an Ethical Oversight Committee and an Online Ethical Oversight Committee. These days ethical oversight means most often cheating online, so the latter committee has an enormous amount of work before it. It is not unusual for the members of these committees to pore through hundreds of pages, examine hundreds of hands, and hear each case for a dozen hours or more. There are still many such cases in the pipeline, involving players from experts through average club players. The Appeals and Charges Committee recently upheld a decision against a known pro.

On a personal note, I am sure we are all looking forward to when we can once again have face-to-face bridge events, be they club games, sectionals, regionals, or NABCs. ACBL management has extended the cancellation of all tournaments through the end of April so it won't be any time soon.

Of course, no one knows when we will return to the real tables, but we do have to plan for what everyone is expecting: lower attendance at the initial events. Let us all support our return to live bridge when it does indeed happen. And let's turn the tables on that little, microscopic matter called COVID-19 that leaves a void in our hearts....in spades.....at our clubs....and you read it here in the Diamond in the Ruff.

Bauer Wins Autumn Festival

Our incoming D21 President and long-term Social Media Chair, Tracey Bauer, won the Autumn 2020 Festival of the Women's Online World Bridge Club. The Festival lasts for a week, offering seven daily tournaments, including pairs, individual, and robot individual. Each tournament was ten boards. The overall ranking is based on the best ten results obtained by a player, not all the player's results.

Bridge Eyes on the Mask

On September 26, 2017, I became a member of ACBL. June 6, 2020, I became a Club Master of Unit 500 of District 21. December 6, 2020, I promoted to Sectional Master.

During this period came COVID-19, masks, shelter-in-place. We bridge players miss the joy and laughter of the club, big and small humor, humanistic care, what delicious snacks, as well as our high fives and hugs.

Until the virtual club was established, we were in pain and sorrow. When I was extremely bored, I started bridge with my 5-year-old grandson, Kevin Wei (in the photo). What we didn't expect was that he was out of control and addicted, not only to playing cards every day, but studying every character on our convention card. That was my first bridge epiphany .

When I started from scratch to be a Master of the club, I experienced 33 months off and on, minus six months as a volunteers' teacher at the 44th World Bridge Championships. It took 27 months.

In this initial period, we don't expect to get any good rank as long as we are happy. However, after becoming a Club Master, bridge became more interesting and I sought opportunities to get master points. The purpose of playing bridge at this stage is to see the smiling faces of friends. That was my second bridge epiphany.

It took only six months to earn the 30 points separating Club and Sectional Masters. In this time BBO and the ACBL created the virtual club scene. I've been able to play in several virtual clubs and earned enough masterpoints in six months. That has been my third bridge epiphany.

I've kept track of the costs of online play from October 23, 2020 to December 6, 2020. \$31.25 for 25 ACBL speedball games, \$30 for six games at Redwood, \$43.75 for 25 Saturday pairs games, \$25 for five games at CCBC, \$2 for one ABA game, \$37 for 37 games at the Sky club. The total cost of 99 games was \$169, with an average cost of \$1.71 per game.

Since June 6, 2020, I've spent \$461.95 earning 33.3 masterpoints for an average cost per master point of \$13.87. With the improvement of bridge technology, the average cost of each master point will gradually become lower. That's my fourth bridge epiphany.

When I hold my certificate, I miss my bridge partner Lynn Gurnee every Wednesday and my bridge partner Carla Francis every Thursday. I remember their good playing skills clearly, but I almost forget their headscarf, hood, height and smiling face. We all long to see each other at a bridge club, and even on line. If online

games can include video, then bridge's intimacy must be stronger. That's my fifth bridge epiphany.

Playing cards online in BBO virtual clubs made me learn how to rewrite my profile, how to post CC to my partner, and how to check the bidding process. How to look back on cards that were already played. How to check the results of other tables. How to pay attention to the etiquette of online bridge. And how to invite partners and find your own club. That has been my sixth bridge epiphany.

How close am I to my next ACBL Rank? I will continue to study, play cards hard and make more friends. 26 red/gold points, 9.35 silver, to 100 Master points. Because these are the guarantees of health. That's my seventh bridge epiphany.

Covid-19, go away. Vaccine, come on. Let's get back to the club soon. My friends, how are you all? There are card friends over 90 years of age. I hope to see you again soon.

The eyes on my mask are already piercing.

The Positive Outcomes of Playing Bridge Online, By Jill Wallace and Sandy Haslem.

It's all about that base, about that base, Bridge Base Online (BBO) that is! Our members are grateful to stay connected and to play via BBO in 2020-2021 while we deal with the many challenges of being socially distanced.

We are especially grateful that our newer players have had a platform that has allowed them to continue learning the game and experience the fun and challenge of playing duplicate bridge. Virtual Club games for the newer players include a 99er game on Thursday and Sunday afternoons, and three weekly Pro-Am games. The three Pro-Am games are defined by the maximum number of masterpoints for the "amateur" of the pair. There is a 200 MP, a 500 MP, and a 750 MP maximum game for the amateur of the pair, giving the "pros" a chance to mentor players at several different levels. It has been fantastic to see so many of our experienced players mentoring our less experienced and intermediate players. The ability to review not only the bidding of a board but also to review how it was played has been especially helpful in these mentoring relationships.

Since closing the Mathewson Bridge Center in March, bridge education has continued online. Parallel coaching sessions, online series of classes and team games have focused on advancing the skills of our newer duplicate bridge players.

Thirty-six players participated in the online "Beginning and Beyond Beginning Bridge" series of 12-week classes in October through December. Another group of over 30 players are registered for an online series of "Declarer Play" that will run for 8 weeks from February through April. One of the benefits of these live series of lessons is the lessons are recorded and can be reviewed as many times as the students want to view them.

Our virtual club games allow for a certain number of guests, so players can play with friends and family across the country. With ACBL "Support Your Club" games, members can play against high level competition while benefitting their home club. In addition, all our members have the opportunity to earn silver, red and gold points in virtual club games and in ACBL tournaments to advance their MP standings as they play from home.

Online play has provided new opportunities and growth in the numbers and playing ability of our players. It will have a prominent place in the future of our club, even after we are able to return to playing face to face duplicate bridge.

Sacramento

Albert Chow, a bridge director and owner of the Sacramento Bridge Center, plans on playing a significant role in the future of bridge



in Sacramento. His life has taken some interesting twists and turns that have led him on this path.

Albert hails from Hong Kong from a family of three sisters and two brothers, where he attended an elementary school for children of officials and expats from Portugal; instruction was in English. Secondary school was a British boarding school, one of the tops in Hong Kong, where he also studied French. If you have noticed that Albert speaks perfect English, it can be partially attributed to the large number of staff from Cambridge and Oxford.

Very few bridge players may be aware of Albert's hidden talents. He initially developed his stage presence performing and directing plays in high school, being voted as the "Best Actor of the Year." He initially learned bridge one year with members of his quiz team and over summer vacation they played five days a week, weekdays from midnight to 6 a.m., then went for dim sum at a nearby restaurant.

After winning a contest on a reality show similar to "America's Got Talent," Albert's folk music group, "The Willows" (which included his sister) toured extensively in Hong Kong performing in a variety of venues. "The Willows" even produced a record, which may still be available in Canada. Amazingly, Albert has had no formal musical training; he just has an exceptional ear for music, which is evident when he discusses it—he likes classical, folk, pop, jazz and his favorite—big band music. Although he was number one in his elite school, he was unable to attend a program in which he was interested at either

of the two universities in Hong Kong. (Of the 70 students in his class, 65 went abroad for their studies due to limited space at local universities). After researching American colleges at the United States Information Service Library, he applied to Pepperdine, Washington State U. and Sac. State; he ultimately chose Sac. State, which he attended for six years, mostly focusing on history. After observing classmates playing bridge in the cafeteria one day, he joined them and then after college one of these friends led him to the Dante Club.

After attending Sac. State, Albert worked his way up to Executive Director of Operations at Tower Records, where he was put in charge of computers and training staff. He was the main buyer at Watt Ave., created manuals for employees, and helped set up new stores. One of the fun things he did was work with architects, which later helped him when opening up the new Sacramento Bridge Center. In 2000, Tower was in financial trouble and downsized; they bought him out.

A couple of years later, after running into a friend from college, Albert discovered video poker, which he still plays as a source of income.

After he left Tower, his involvement with bridge increased, and he began directing about 21 years ago, after John and Ronnie McMurdie asked him to take over one of their games. Around 2015, Albert volunteered to take responsibility for the club (once again at the encouragement of John McMurdie) after they lost their lease from the Dante Club and had to move precipitously.

Previously, all the directors shared the lease, but this was no longer in the cards...It was such a major ordeal moving twice and then remodeling a gutted office building to suit very specific needs. Club members stepped up with major monetary donations, time and advice. His Tower experience helped prepare him for this big undertaking. I asked Albert why he did it. "I wanted to continue the passion of so many people—it's a huge loss if we can't continue with this passion. It would be a shame to let that fade away. Bridge is a brilliant game and fabulous hobby—there are not too many games like it!" "It's not doable for one person," he emphasized. "So many people help—people give classes, run games, prepare food and help out. It takes a lot of people."

In his spare time, he likes to surf the Net, satiating his curiosity about a multitude of topics, including music and religion. Albert is also an excellent cook, evident from the creative meals he serves at games ("Tuna Tuesdays" aside!). He appreciates good cuisine, especially Chinese comfort food, as well as French, Thai and Creole.

Albert elaborated, "The club is holding up financially thanks to all the players, and directors who won't take pay online—everything's donated, and nobody has grumbled," explained Albert. It's been goodwill to develop a Virtual Club for the benefit of the local clubs. Although Albert is involved with the financial aspect, for all intents and purposes Teri Smoot is the boss. "I gave her the authority to do whatever she pleases," he continued." I can't run the games and prepare for the

future." He added, "She's superb, she's a gem. And kudos as well to Dave Willmott, Jim Coke, Dave Vidaver (and Albert) who currently direct along with Teri." Jim Coke wrote a computer program to determine the division of the fees--\$4.00 of each fee goes back to the clubs according to where the player played in the previous year.

"The club will probably not re-open until the fall—we can't re-open until there is herd immunity. The players have to feel safe. We may have to open partially. Food is going to be a problem—we won't be able to serve buffet for a while. Different factors mitigate the outcome—we're in a precarious demographic. We will be taking an abundance of caution: masks, more severe cleaning, probably less tables, bidding verbally possibly, and disinfecting cards before the game. We cannot eliminate all risks...When we re-open, we will not be sure of the world. We will probably keep the online (depending on ACBL) and the physical club. There are going to be a lot of changes. At the point we re-open, things depend on the support of our players. A certain number will stay online; some people are not ambulatory and won't have to drive. We're not sure now of the format. We'll only come back when it feels comfortable and safe. We may have to build the number of tables slowly as if starting from scratch. There may not be games every day. It may take a couple of years to bring it back. Currently, about half of our club members (200) are playing online".

The advance of online commerce hurt the bookstores because they were not ready to take on a digital age and Albert

is determined to not let that happen to hurt the future of bridge. “We can put the two delivery systems side-by-side and bring out the better of the two worlds. That’s my challenge—I’d like to move us forward. We should try to do it right if we want bridge to survive and thrive with the best of face-to-face and online. This is new to us. Let’s make this a better experience for everyone!”
